**An Advent Reflection: The Generation with the  
Highest Abortion Rates Faces Final Things**

As we enter the season of Advent, and anticipate the great feast of Christmas, this is the perfect time to give attention to some long neglected areas of life that need reconciliation and healing.

For those who have participated in the death of a preborn child, this may have eternal significance.

The decade of the 1980's was a period when our nation had the highest abortion rates. The U.S. abortion ratio reached its peak in 1984, with 364

*abortions for every thousand live births.* The high mark since the legalization of abortion occurred in 1988 with 1,590,800 procedures. [1](#)

Many of these same young women and men who experienced abortion loss, are entering a time of life when children have been raised, as they transition to retirement. This can be a wonderful time of discovering the joys of grandchildren, and the opportunity to explore new interests and travel.

But as the years pass, we also begin to experience the loss of dear relatives and friends, and confront the natural physical losses associated with aging. This may spark the initiation a deeper examination of one's life and contemplation on deeper issues of faith, death and judgement.

It is tragic that the faith experience for some people featured a steady and abusive stream of messages with a singular emphasis on personal sin, damnation and hell. This reveals a failure to share the compassionate love, mercy and forgiveness of our Heavenly Father, and the joy of the Gospel.

But it is a grave error to shift so far from the sickness of fear-based faith, to abandoning belief in our final judgement and the consequence of eternal separation from God due to persistent, un-repentant serious sin.

Many of the great mystics and theologians of the Church speak of a time immediately following death, when we will experience a review of our life in the light of God's love, mercy, but also His justice.

Many people today consider judgement and hell outdated concepts. How can a loving God condemn a person to eternal suffering?

First, it is important to point out that many women and men avoid reconciliation and healing, not because they are in denial of their sin, but because of shame, fear, and self-condemnation. This reveals the importance of the Silent No More Awareness Campaign, as an essential source of education and healing. [Abortion testimonies](#) are a very effective means to bring wounded souls to a deeper understanding of the common symptoms suffered after abortion, and the blessing and benefits of [abortion healing programs](#).

But sadly, the prevailing culture can feed a tendency to justify, and deny the consequences of serious sin. We can deny how abortion has wounded our hearts as women and men, mothers and fathers, and the natural need for repentance and healing. As we often hear in those sharing [abortion testimonies](#), this can lead to great suffering for the parents of aborted children, and their love ones.

For those who face death still unrepentant of serious sin, the encounter with the light of God's perfect love, mercy, and justice may be a searing, painful shock that will shake them to the core of their being.

Might a person become so attached to their denial, justification, and [celebration of sin](#) that they will be repelled by the light and truth of God?

Could such a soul be tempted to shut themselves off from receiving this truth, from accepting the mercy of God that will move them to repentance and healing? Could a soul become so overwhelmed by the consequences of their actions that they are tempted by Satan to reject salvation?

This is a great mystery. What we can know definitely in this life, is that God wants his children with him for all eternity. He became one of us, in Christ Jesus, to reveal his great love for us, his power over sin and death, and the glory of his resurrection.

This points to the value of an [abortion healing program](#) to safely open the wounded heart and soul to accept God's love and mercy. With the benefit of deep emotional and spiritual healing, those wounded by abortion can now receive the blessed grace to embrace their aborted children, now living in the Lord, with love and hope.

### **Be Not Afraid**

For those that reach out in humility to receive the forgiveness and healing mercy of Jesus, there is nothing to fear, in this life, or in death. We are all sinners in need of God's healing and forgiveness.

If you have an area of serious sin in your life like abortion, or multiple abortions in your past, don't let fear keep you from the love and mercy of God. Even if you are facing a terminal illness, and in your final days, you can still find reconciliation, healing and peace. It is never too late, and the Lord hungers to receive you into his loving embrace.

Remember, as Jesus told us, the angels in heaven rejoice when just one sinner repents and reconciles with their Heavenly Father. This Advent season, let us rejoice in the precious gift of Christ Jesus, and share the Good News of reconciliation and peace with all those wounded by abortion.

## **Rachel's Vineyard in Puerto Rico** By Emily Babilonia

In October 2021, we had Fr. Jose Colon, General Vicar to the Bishop of Puerto Rico, serve as the weekend priest in our Spanish retreat. Fr. Jose immediately fell in love with El Viñedo de Raquel. On Friday night, he called his Bishop, Monsignor Luis Francisco Miranda of the Fajardo-Humacao Diocese, and explained our retreat to him. Bishop Miranda promptly said to Fr. Jose, "What are you waiting for? Bring the beautiful retreat to our Diocese." We quickly started to work and train a team: Patricia Ortiz and Karla Cintron (from our April retreat in Palm Beach, FL), Fr. Juan Figueroa, Fr. Yoel Flores, Janice Martinez, Mother Isabel, and Deacon Johnathon (who will be ordained a priest on December 3rd). Our first retreat was planned for November 11-13, 2022, with Monsignor Miranda and Fr. Jose presiding at Holy Mass.

We planned our trip to leave from Florida on Thursday, November 10, but it


was canceled because of hurricane Nicole, which was predicted to pass through Palm Beach. So some members of my team had to text their bosses to see if we could leave Wednesday, and praise be to God, we did!

I feel overjoyed and so thankful to our Heavenly Father for allowing us to witness His Mercy and Healing once again. We had 11 participants, including one couple, one 79-year-old male, and one 77-year-old female—and we honored 26 babies. There was much pain, shame, anxiety, depression, and trauma throughout the weekend. However, we were able to see God's Love & Mercy the entire time.

We also built a Memorial for the Unborn in Fajardo. It's in the Diocese's local store where a lot of people will be able to witness that life begins at conception. Bishop Miranda did the Blessing; he was so happy that our team was able to raise the money (we sold candles as a fundraiser, and an anonymous person helped, as well). Thank you, Lord Jesus, for always leading us!!





## **Changing Hearts and Minds The Powerful Testimony of Patricia Sandoval**

She stood at the center of the room, passionately sharing her story. The young adults in the room were mesmerized by what they heard: heartbreak, homelessness, and drugs. Some sat silently crying, others appeared stunned.

Both reactions are typical for people who listen to Patricia Sandoval's testimony.

For years, she's been inspiring young women and men around the world, changing their hearts, and saving more babies than she can count.

Having had three abortions as a young woman, she speaks candidly about the trauma she experienced and the aftermath of her abortions: suicidal feelings, addiction to meth, and living on the streets. As a former employee of Planned Parenthood, she also reveals what goes on behind the scenes at the clinics. But her story is one of hope. Through the intervention of a stranger, Patricia's life suddenly turned around. She found healing at a Rachel's Vineyard retreat and has been impassioned to empower young adults by giving them the facts and helping them make pro-life choices. Patricia is an author, pro-life activist, co-host of the EWTN Spanish show, *Informe ProVida*, and has been lauded as "one of the best international, chastity and pro-life speakers in the world, addressing audiences of thousands and government officials around the world."



## United in Prayer

We are hearing very little in the news about the riots in Haiti, but our friend, Anne Arthur, has been updating us about what's going on. Anne Arthur started and nurtured the Rachel's Vineyard site in Germany, and worked on team in Jamaica, before returning home to her family in Haiti. She shares:

They vandalized all the Catholic churches in Gonaives. Stole everything in the presbyteries. All Catholic churches and the convents were looted – they stole the school furniture and materials, the vestments. Everything is gone. Catholic Charities lost all food supplies.

The entire city is locked in. Barricades of all kinds and very aggressive men at work. The police are fighting day and night but are overwhelmed. We don't have an army. These rioters bring us to our knees. This is civil war at its worst kind. We are locked in, no way in or out of our streets. Lots of violence, looting, burning businesses and houses, many dead people. We've no idea where this will end.

We have a charity here, which is the only reliable ambulance service in the country. When the hospitals had to close most of their departments because of lack of fuel, lack of electricity, oxygen, and meds, we managed to go out and help people, as we do in disasters and on a regular basis every day. We bought fuel on the black market for \$30/gallon but could get to people to save lives, help birthing babies, care for gunshot victims, etc. My son Philippe and I are on the board of Directors of the Hero Foundation, Inc., which is registered in Florida. Please pray for us, pray for Haiti.

As we remember our dear friend, we reflect on the chapter Fr. Peter wrote for the book, "Spirituality, Mythopoesis, and Learning":

"The retreat uses storytelling and Christian symbols to empower those caught in the trap of grief and guilt. When I was first introduced to the Rachel's Vineyard Retreat in 2000, I was intrigued by the enthusiasm of the participants and the clarity of their healing. As a retreat facilitator, I was struck by the transformative power of storytelling in the retreat process. I remember hearing participants recall on the Saturday the horror of the abortion event, what led to the abortion and its effects, with predictable expressions of hopelessness, pain, low self-esteem, and inability to find healing, forgiveness and love. Through the retreat process there was almost equal certainty that their stories of fear and loss would be transformed into stories that held out hope for change, recognition of the reality of what had happened and a chance for healing from the debilitating grief and loss that had been a constant part of their lives, bearing scars of varying degrees. I became interested in what brought about that change. The storytelling process has the power to help participants see the story again from a new perspective; recognise who is suffering and in need of healing; and rewrite the story in a way that is more truthful and helpful. They now hear themselves describing the event and its effects with greater compassion for themselves and others in their story.

Many events occur in our lives that disorient us. It might be falling in love, a car accident, taking an overseas holiday or losing a loved one. These events can have a transforming effect in our lives or leave us overwhelmed and unable to function, even if only temporarily. In transformative learning theory, these events can be referred to as the 'disorienting dilemma' (Mezirow 1991). The disorienting dilemma can be used to help someone grow or it can be a missed opportunity for growth. Many participants on Rachel's Vineyard Retreats report that they found the abortion experience to be a time of diminishment rather than growth. Those working in this ministry have been privileged to facilitate processes that can turn that around and allow the disorienting dilemma to become a moment of growth.

The learning/healing approach used in the Rachel's Vineyard Retreats is one of mutual nurturing and storytelling. This learning takes place through a series of processes that identify a more connected way of imagining and understanding the story, its veracity, its actors and its aftermath in the participant's life. This is

achieved through mutual respect for the participants' personal stories and practices, enabling their story to intersect with some key Christian rituals and symbolic practices. These include reading stories from the gospel with a meditation and ritual that help bring the story into the participants' lives and various imaginative prayer practices including guided meditation, music and song.

We also use the Catholic sacraments of anointing of the sick, reconciliation and Eucharist. Anointing of the sick emphasises healing from grief and loss. The sacrament of reconciliation focuses on healing guilt, not just around the abortion itself, but around the ongoing poor self-image that seems so common among participants. This sacrament invites participants to embrace a God who still loves them no matter what and we then invite them to re-imagine themselves as good, loving and lovable, which we consider a key element in the meaning of this sacrament. It also symbolises a re-connection with the church, which for some is extremely important as they feel alienated from their faith. The Eucharist is also a sign of re-establishing ties with the community from which they feel alienated. In the Catholic symbolic story world, receiving communion is the ultimate sign of acceptance, something they feel they have lost through their past actions." (p230-231)


